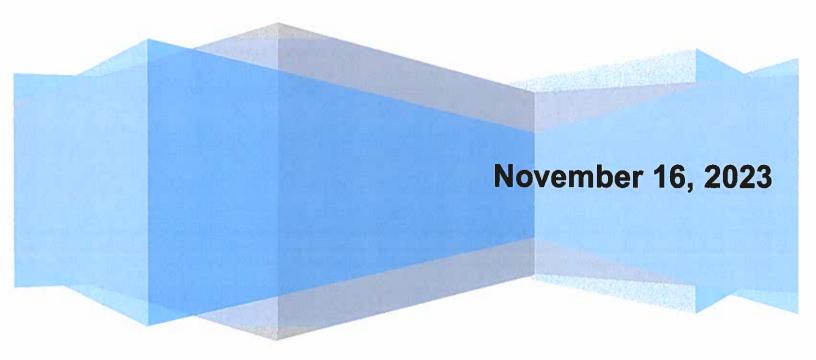

The ASC helps navigate the myriad of services offered by government agencies, non-profits, and other providers.
